How do I virtually visit each place Enrichment-style?

- 1. Plan a trip! Since your tour is "somewhere else", figure out the "hows". How you would get there, how long it would take, what modes of transportation you would take, and how much it would cost? Then, make yourself a budget and map out a breakdown of the total expenses of the trip.

 2. Leave a "review" of your tour! Tell us the highs and lows of your experience. What is something you learned and would like to further investigate? If you could change one thing about your virtual tour, what would it be? Write a letter to the organization detailing your experience.

- 4. Make a tri-fold pamphlet of your Zoo/Museum, highlighting certain animals/artifacts of your choosing. Then, present it to a family member soliciting financial support for this organization explaining why it is important for it to remain open during the national crisis.
- 5. Research the job of the museum curator and make a log as to what the job entails. Be a curator of your own museum of historical events that have happened in your life as you have been social-distancing. Invite your family to take a free tour of your new museum.

- 6. Choose an animal from one of the zoo tours and write a story answering this "What If" Question. What if that zoo animal were to come live with you? How would you need to modify your environment to make it feasible for you and your new friend to be co-habitants?
- 7. Recreate an art exhibit that interests you by using the technique of pointillism. You can get inspiration from this music

- 8. Choose a picture from an art gallery and write scene in a play/screenplay using the characters and setting in the scene and either make a stop-motion animation film or act it out with your family.

- 10. After choosing one, or more, of the above activities, ask either your mom or dad to "post" a picture or two of your results, tagging the museum and/or the zoo. Be sure to include a heartfelt "THANK YOU" for allowing us to utilize their space while we are not in school.
