THE PAST TWO WEEKS WE...

...have read lots of books during Shared Reading about numerals, number words, counting forwards and counting backwards. Some of the titles we have read are Ten Black Dots, Five Little Ducks, Ten Little Puppies, Five Little Monkeys Jumping on the Bed, Ten Nine Eight, How Many Snails?, One White Sail, Quack and Count, and A Cake for Barney.

...have been focusing on phonemic awareness skills during Shared Journal. Before children learn to read and write they must first understand how the sounds in words work. They must understand that words are made up of speech sounds. One specific way to help your child at home develop this skill is producing the first sound in words. The next time you are in the car with your child or eating dinner, ask them to tell you the sound (**not** what letter...that skill comes next) in certain items you see around. Make it a game and even let them ask you. For example, ask your child "What sound do you hear at the beginning of spoon?" They should reply with the /s/ sound (remember, not the letter name!) Vowels tend to be harder than consonants and some stop sounds (like /b/) are more difficult than continuous sounds (like /m/.) You may have to really exaggerate and/or repeat the beginning sounds at first.

Please help your child be successful in PE and recess by sending them to school in tennis shoes. This gives them the opportunity to safely play and be as active as possible! ©
