Important Message from ACS's Central Office

After discussion with our School Resource Officers and our local fire department, it has been decided that no automobile will be permitted to park or idle in the fire lane in front of an ACS school building. This ensures that the fire lane is clear for emergency personnel, and that we are creating the safest environment possible. Additionally, automobiles picking up car riders are not permitted to park or idle in the car line more than thirty (30) minutes before the dismissal of students for the school day. Reading Strategy to Try at Home: Model Your Thinking

Strong readers do more than pronounce the letters on the page. They actually have a conversation in their heads with the text. One way you can help your child to become a stronger reader is to have this conversation out loud as you are reading together. For example, as you read a picture book you might be wondering what will happen on the next page. Instead of just thinking that, say it out loud to your child. Or, you might be reading a chapter book when you get surprised by something a character does. Express this to your child. This shows him/her that reading requires thinking. Listed below are some sentence starters that represent common "thoughts" a reader might have. Remember, we hope that you are reading at least 20 minutes a night with your child!

- I predict...
- I am surprised...
- I just connected...
- I am confused by...
- I remember...
- This character seems...
- I did/didn't like...
- This page made me feel...





Health Highlight

We all know that we need a good night's sleep to feel our best, but did you know that sleep is necessary for learning? Each night our brain engages in something called consolidation. This is the process of taking all the information that we experienced that day, and moving it to our longterm memory. Short-term memory is like a box – it can only hold so much. However, long-term memory is infinite. We can constantly add new information to our long-term memory so that we can get to it later. This only happens during consolidation, and consolidation only takes place when we are in a deep sleep. This means that your child needs between 9-11 hours of uninterrupted sleep every night in order for their brain to go through this important process. To help your child get high quality sleep make sure to remove televisions and electronic devices from the room, and try to stick to a consistent bedtime even on the weekends. We want our All-Star brains ready for learning each day!
