- This information will cover pre-colonization settlements, European exploration, early colonization efforts, and colonial society in the 1700s.
- The information will be covered on the AP Exam, so it is recommended that you take your own reading notes.
- Use the Venn Diagram and the Colonial Era Chart to help organize information in your readings.
- Complete the Colonization Map and 13 British Colonies Map that are included in your packet.

- You will turn in all the above work completed on the first day of class. Late work will NOT be accepted.
- You will have a 50-point quiz on the information covered in the "1491" article and Colonization on the second day of class. The quiz will be a mixture of multiple choice and short answer.


Additional Requirements/Concerns:

Based on your reading of the article, thoroughly answer the following questions, citing to page numbers in the article:


- 1. When the author (and his son) was a high school student what did he learn about the origins of Indians coming to the Americas and the impact they had on the environment?
- 2. What's the summary of the views of archaeologists like Clark Erikson and William Balee?
- 3. How does the author say the new theories implicate today's ecological battles?
- 4. In 1966 Henry F. Dobyns challenged the commonly held belief that there were only about 1.15 million Indians in the Americas when Europeans arrived. Dobyns concluded the number was more likely between 90-112 million. Summarize how he came to this radically different conclusion.
- 5. What was his estimate on the impact of epidemics on the Americas in the first 130 years?
- 6. Explain how domesticated animals from Europe, such as pigs brought by Hernando de Soto, likely impacted the spread of disease in the Indian population.
- 7. What does smallpox historian Elizabeth Fenn say about the debate over the numbers of Indians in the Americas?
- 8. What impact did Indian agriculture, like maize, have on Africa? The creation of cities like Aztec capital of Tenochtitlan?
- 9. When the author asked seven anthropologists, archaeologists, and historians if they would rather be a typical Indian or European in 1491, how did they answer?
- 10. Explain the multiple ways Indians "cleverly exploited" their environment.
- 11. Identify 5 new specific facts about Indians in the Americas before 1492 that you learned from this article.


